Lent study course – starting this week

Our Lent study course “Come and see: Journeying through Lent with John’s Gospel” begins this week. There are two opportunities:

- Thursday lunchtimes from 1pm for an hour, with a light lunch (soup and a roll) served at 12.30pm. (If you can’t come until 1pm, or have to leave at 1.30pm, that’s fine – please still do come along!)
- Friday evenings from 7.45pm until about 9.30pm (separate from Table Talk, which is now several weeks into the same course).

Both will run weekly, and there are five sessions in the course. If you can’t make either of those, then the same course is running at Toft Methodist Church every Wednesday morning (from 10.15am to 11.45am) starting on 28th February. The same course at Haslingfield Methodist Church on Sunday evenings from 6.30pm has already started, but you would still be welcome to join (the next one is this evening).

The topics of each of the five Thursday sessions are listed in the February *Castle View* – the Friday evenings will be the same as the day before.

“Making Refuge: Creative Responses to the Refugee Crisis”

Great St. Mary's Church and the Michaelhouse Centre are pleased to invite everyone to this Monday lunchtime series on creative responses to the refugee crisis, featuring activists, artists, filmmakers and politicians. The talks are at the Michaelhouse Centre (home of the Michaelhouse Café), and start at 1pm (12.30pm on 19th March) with a soup lunch from 12.30pm (£2 suggested donation for lunch).

The speakers and topics are as follows:

- 19th Feb: Vaughan Pilikian, Documentary filmmaker whose forthcoming work, *Flight*, is about the journeys of refugees through Europe.
- 26th Feb: Stephen Wordsworth, Executive Director, the Council for At Risk Academics (CARA), helping academics in danger since 1933.
- 5th Mar: Ed Sexton, member of the Cambridge Convoy Refugee Action Group (CamCRAG), responding to the refugee situation in Europe.
- 12th Mar: Daniel Eng, Divinity Faculty PhD candidate and winner of the Goodwin Prize for his work on how the teaching of Jesus applies to Immigrant Care and Refugee Relief.
- 19th Mar: Cllr. Lewis Herbert, Leader, Cambridge City Council, speaking on Cambridge initiatives to help 100 refugees from Syria and refugees from other countries. (Note: this talk starts at 12.30pm).
- 26th Mar: Issam Kourbaj, Artist in Residence, Christ's College whose work *Another Day Lost* was inspired by and based on the Syrian refugee crisis.

Concert by the Pontanima choir from Sarajevo, 3rd March

The Woolf Institute is organising this concert in the chapel at Robinson College on Saturday 3rd March at 6.30pm. The Pontanima choir was established as a peace and reconciliation initiative following the Bosnian war, and aims to bring back together people pushed apart by the conflict. Its repertoire is drawn from the Jewish, Muslim and Christian traditions that form the unique culture of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

At the start, Dr. Nedžad Avdić, one of the very few survivors of the Srebrenica massacre, will speak briefly about how his experiences in the war led to his work to ensure recognition of what happened as part of rebuilding peace and bringing about reconciliation between different factions. After the concert there will be a drinks reception in Hall.
