A Tribute to Janet Houghton 16th July 1931- 15th March 2024

The Thanksgiving service for the life of Janet Houghton was a fitting tribute to a much loved and respected member of our church family.

Having been born into an active Methodist family, Janet contributed much to the life of Addiscombe Methodist Church in Croydon, having efficiently held almost every possible office throughout her time there. On moving to Histon she became an active member of our church and supported all the various activities. After moving to Cottenham Court when she needed more care, Janet's interest in our church and its members continued, always wanting to know what was going on even when she was unable to attend.

Janet was a highly regarded teacher for all her working life. She was conscientious, generous with her time, and took an interest in all the children in her care, showing exceptional patience and ensuring each child felt valued.

She was proud to become head of Annerley Infant School, where she spent 17 years until it was amalgamated with the Junior School in 1989 and where she was able to play a key part in the smooth transition.

Key points in Janet's character shone through all the many tributes and anecdotes received from family, church friends and work colleagues.

She was a truly independent woman: she knew her own mind and wasn't afraid to speak it, and was respected for it!

She also had a real sense of humour and fun; family members and friends all had an enjoyable time when they visited her home.

Janet was a good listener and encourager, caring, thoughtful, considerate, and kind.

Her strong Christian faith as a member of the Methodist Church was the cornerstone of her life,

and she was a shining example to us all. She will be greatly missed and affectionately remembered.

Graham Marsh RIP

Local Preacher Graham Marsh led our Church Anniversary service at Castle Street last October. Sadly, he died in March at his home in Gerrards Cross, Buckinghamshire, aged nearly 95.

Graham was born in Haymarket Terrace, Castle Hill area in 1929, and brought up within the Castle Street congregation and youth club where his father Percy Marsh was a Local Preacher, amongst other roles. He attended the Perse School and was, I believe, a conscientious objector, so instead of National Service served on the farm at NIAB on Huntingdon Road.

His grandparents Arthur and Caroline Marsh are remembered in the ornate plaque near the sound desk in our church. There were three other sons (Arthur, Henry, and Herbert—thus uncles to Graham) all of whom became Methodist ministers, with Herbert especially having an important influence on our church in 1915 when he stood in for our appointed minister John Day Thompson during his year away as President of the Primitive Methodist Conference. Herbert lived to 101. Graham's parents and grandparents are buried and have memorials in the nearby Histon Road Cemetery for non-conformists.

In his life, Graham served in the councils of several counties as a Social Services Children's Officer. Tennis was his major pastime apart from being very active in church affairs.

His first wife was Cecelia Cadamy, daughter of a Methodist minister retired at Thetford. They married at Castle Street in 1954. She died in 2015, so he married again to a retired URC minister Jean Wilkinson who also pre-deceased him a year ago. He leaves a son Neal, a doctor in Somerset, and a daughter Caroline in Auckland New Zealand. The Marsh family have many connections to Castle Street and the Cambridge area. They originate in the village of West Wratting near Linton where the father, John Precious Marsh, was also a local preacher as well as an agricultural labourer, as recorded in the census.

Graham's cousin Leslie (son of Herbert) also became a Methodist minister; he is currently retired in Oxford, but likely to move to Cambridge soon as his daughter Louise is married to the recently arrived director of music at Lt St Mary's Church.

Graham's uncle Arthur started his ministry in 1910 in the Sleaford, Lincs circuit, where his senior was a certain Nathaniel Boocock, grandfather of the writer of this note!
