Histon toilet project update

We are delighted to report that we have now raised enough funds to start the toilet redevelopment.

Thanks to everyone for their fantastic response to our fundraising effort, however we still need to continue fund raising through to the end of the year to complete the project.

The builders will begin on 2nd September and are expected to be finished by the end of October.

We envisage that all activities in the church and hall will continue as normal—however there will be no access to the old kitchen or the corridor. Please bear with us as the work is carried out.

When the contractors start work we will have to restrict parking at church to allow them clear access. So, for approximately six to eight weeks starting 2nd September, Mondays to Fridays 8am–5pm, there will only be parking for 3 cars, and these will be for blue badge holders only. If this applies to you please can you park parallel to the road. There will be no parking on the right hand side area facing the church. Weekend parking should not be affected.

Two portable toilets, one wheelchair accessible, will be positioned on the car park in front of the meeting room/vestry. These will be unlocked at times when the building is in use.

He had one final simulator check to pass which he failed—but not through any fault of his own. The examiner was being examined himself by the CAA and the examiner failed his exam which meant that Paul's test was null and void! Instead of staying at the airport waiting for the details of the next exam, he took a risk and came to Histon to share with us.

By the time you read this he will have had his first of 50 observational flights and after that he will be fully qualified. It's been a long journey since 20th March but we are nearly there!

Castle Street Communion Rota

We are looking for more volunteers to help with our Holy Communion Rota on a Sunday at Castle Street. Communion takes place on average once a month. During term time, the students take responsibility for coordinating Communion, but we are looking for some more volunteers to help with this important ministry outside term time. The job requires someone to look at the plan, spot when the services are, contact the volunteers, see which ones they can help with, and send out the rota. The Communion steward needs to arrive before the service starts and bring a gluten free roll or take one out of the freezer, fill up the communion cups and lay the table with cloths. It is helpful if they also steward during communion and finally wash up after the service. I was a

communion steward for many years before ministry and it's quite a fun job! Realistically because the students can help out, this is a commitment which will be about 6 times a year. Please contact me if you are interested in doing this or can coordinate the rota.

Dear Friends at Histon Methodist Church,

Thank you for all the support you've given us this past year. Your contribution is making a lasting, positive impact on vulnerable children and families in Cambridge, a city marked by significant inequality.

Thanks to your support, our holistic approach of long-term, intensive one-to-one support and community outreach provides a lifeline for families in crisis. We are preventing tragedies in families experiencing challenges that are making life difficult, such as poverty, poor mental health and domestic abuse. Together, we are reducing the risks of children falling away from education, breaking often intergenerational cycles of poverty, trauma, and disadvantage, and giving them a chance to thrive.

Your help has made a real difference. We're so grateful to have you as part of our Red Hen family.

Testimony

Sarah joined Castle Street Methodist Church about a year ago because she was interested in Christianity. She works alongside Jess, who simply said "you don't need to go to any other church but ours" and invited her to join Castle Street. She's been a regular ever since when her shifts allow and was baptised and confirmed on Christmas Eve 2023. This is her testimony from that service.

For those of you who I have not had the chance to meet yet, my name is Sarah. Please bear with me, words have never been my strong point, but I will try my best.

I haven't been attending Castle Street long, but in this short time, I have come to meet some amazing people—people that have shown me compassion and kindness. People that have really opened my eyes and been so welcoming. I feel honoured to become a part of this lovely family here at Castle Street.

Jessica played a big part in my journey to start attending church just a few short months ago. After a few questions, I knew I wanted to come and see what it was all about for myself—and I'm glad I did. The feeling I get when I walk into this church is like no other I've ever experienced. I feel happy, I feel like I am not judged—which unfortunately is a feeling I know all too well.

During my childhood religion was never talked about: the only little part I had was the hymns in school, which I looked forward to everyday even though at that time to be honest I couldn't understand them as much as I do now—to me they were just songs where as now they come to me more like stories and I understand the meanings behind them more.

I was not part of a religious background growing up; this was something that we did not talk about as a family. I did not feel that I could open up to my parents and share with them what I may have learned from school, the hymns or even the occasional church trip which I would so often keep to myself—so coming here and deciding to get baptised was for sure not a quick decision; it's something I had been thinking about for a while.

My life has been a bit chaotic: I've not had the easiest of times growing up, but I am thankful for the lessons I have learnt along the way and know that there are others in life going through some hard times too, especially this time of year.

My parents separated when I was at a very young age. I then moved around a lot—which at that age was fairly fun: to have a new bedroom as often as I did. I attended new schools what felt like every week: it was actually very hard to fit in being the new kid often having no friends and spending my lunchtimes in the bathroom alone.

We stopped celebrating Christmas when I was 10, and I would often open presents alone Christmas morning with nothing to look forward to for the remainder of the day.

There would be times we would sit in darkness and in the cold due to not having enough money for bills. But even after all of this, it's taught me so much; it made me very independent and I grew up quick which isn't always a bad thing.

To be baptised today of all days is something I can look back on and remember as Christmas has never really been a magical time of year for me, but it is now something I can look on with joy and hope for my future when this time of year comes around.

I thank the Lord for the path he has lead me down. Without Him I wouldn't be who I am today. I believe God has been around me my entire life looking after me and watching over when I needed Him the most.

On this new path I pray that god will give me the wisdom I need in life. I thank God for this new start.
